Dear Ohana of the Newman Center,

On Monday, January 18, our nation celebrates Martin Luther King Day. This day was created in honor of Dr. King and his contributions to society. It is interesting to note that the event typically referred to as the starting point of the Civil Rights Movement occurred on December 1, 1955 when Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat for a white passenger on a public bus in Montgomery Alabama. Parks was arrested for violating the Jim Crow laws. As a result, the head of the NAACP and Martin Luther King, Jr. supported a boycott of the bus company, dubbed the Montgomery Bus Boycott. The boycott of the bus line lasted for over one year.

His most well-known achievement occurred in 1963 with the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom. Thousands gathered to support the cause. During this event, Dr. King gave his famous "I Have a Dream" speech for which he is remembered.

During the following years, Dr. King went on to found the Southern Christian Leadership Conference and preached non-violent resistance against the injustices that minorities were undergoing at the time. He felt that the non-violent obedience would garner a great deal of media coverage, which would, in turn, lead to a feeling of sympathy in public circles.

Because of his views and efforts, King was a hated figure during his day. When he went to Memphis, Tennessee in March of 1968 to support the black employees of the public works department, he was assassinated while standing on the balcony of his hotel room. Riots ensued during the following days and more than 300,000 people attended King's funeral less than a week later. The strike that he traveled to Memphis to support was also settled within days after he was killed.

King's impact defined the early 1960's. Through his efforts, many people were eventually granted rights that they might not have today. The right to vote, the right of desegregation of public places and schools, labor rights, and other basic rights were all promoted and granted because of his work.

On October 19, 1983, the Senate passed the resolution to create the Martin Luther King Jr. holiday with a vote of 78-22. The bill was signed by Ronald Regan and the holiday became official a few weeks later on November 2, 1983.

A little history puts things in perspective for us. Enjoy your weekend and holiday.
