People often turned to Saint Blaise for healing miracles. At each Mass next week Fr. Alfred will be blessing throats after the homily using two candles.



Reflections from the Pastor

This past week we celebrated the Feast of St. Marianne Cope of Molokai. I had the privilege of giving the closing prayer and benediction with the students, faculty, and staff of St. Francis School for their gathering in front of the St. Marianne Cope statue on that day. In 1883, Mother Marianne and six other Sisters of St. Francis left for Hawai'i to run the Kaka'ako Receiving Station for people suspected of having leprosy. It is said that she promised the sisters that she would be back. After arriving in Buffalo on train, Mother Marianne realized she forgot her purse and had to go back to Syracuse. Her promise was fulfilled and to Hawai'i they went, never returning to the Motherhouse in Syracuse. In 1888, Mother Marianne and two other sisters went to Moloka'i to open a home for "unprotected women and girls." She eventually took charge of the home for men and boys as well that St. Damien had opened. Mother Marianne worked in Kalaupapa, Moloka'i for thirty years and never contracted Hansen's Disease. St. Marianne Cope stands to be a model for us of faithful service to the Lord and of profound trust in His grace and mercy. St. Marianne Cope, pray for us!

Adult Confirmation or First Communion

The Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA) might be for you if you are either of the following:

- 1) a Catholic without the sacraments of confirmation and/or communion;
- 2) baptized members of *other* Christian communities; or
- 3) Un-baptized adult.

Why? To help you explore Catholicism and then decide whether to become full members of the Catholic Church.

How? Weekly meetings with community members, talk with other Catholics about their experience, meet "new" Catholics about why and how they joined the Church, to learn about the Bible, the church, Catholic Christian traditions, resources for personal reading and study, opportunities for private consultation.

Have you ever lost the directions for the assembly of an item or for a place that you are travelling to? Without proper instructions, we can end up ruining what we are putting together or we may become lost on our way. The people of Israel, as described in the reading from the Book of Nehemiah, had lost the book of the law. Their tears of joy and sadness, upon hearing the law once again, are evidence that not having those directions had resulted in much heartache; they had lost their way.

Jesus Christ has come to give us the directions for abundant life, now and forever. Those directions are found in today's gospel as Christ proclaims the direction that his life and ministry would take. He proclaims that his anointing is to bring glad tidings, liberty, recovery of sight, and freedom from oppression. We are reminded that all of us, by virtue of our baptism, have been anointed to do the same things. In this way, the scriptures will be fulfilled in our hearing and doing of God's word.

If we lead this sort of life, we will experience the unity in diversity that St. Paul's speaks of in the second reading. Oneness in the body of Christ occurs when we, first of all, respect the differences of each person. Each person has something to contribute. Respecting differences doesn't mean that we agree always or condone every behavior or attitude. It does mean that we see that each person is a child of God with infinite worth and is worthy of our love. Oneness in the body of Christ occurs when we make it a priority to work together, even though we are different. We must recognize that we need each other in order to be healthy members of Christ's body. We should be concerned for all the members of the body, especially those that are suffering.

If we live a life of unity, we will experience the things that Jesus says in the gospel that he came to proclaim. His words will be fulfilled in our hearing as we fulfill the challenge of our calling.

Back Page Series on 'What is Campus Ministry?'

Week 1: History of Campus Ministry. The Church's response to current opportunities on campus will benefit from an awareness of the history of the Newman Movement in the United States.⁵ This ministry began in 1883 at the University of Wisconsin with the founding, through lay initiative, of the Melvin Club which was designed to keep Catholics on campus in touch with their religious heritage. A decade later the first Newman Club was established at the University of Pennsylvania, with much the same purpose. It was named after John Henry Cardinal Newman, who was the English leader in the nineteenth-century intellectual renewal in the Church and later was chosen the great patron of campus ministers in our country. Clubs for Catholic students were established in public institutions. In 1908, the second stage began with the establishment of the first association of these Catholic Clubs in state universities, what would become the National Newman Club Federation until 1969. After the Second Vatican Council the Church had grown in appreciation and support of campus ministry (formerly known as the university apostolate). There is an increased commitment to providing well-trained campus ministers who appreciate the need for continued professional and theological development. Campus Ministry has become an integral part of the Church's mission to the world and must be seen in that light.


