Reflection from the Pastor

Hosanna to the King of David! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord! Wave your palm branches! This weekend marks the beginning of the holiest of weeks in the Church's liturgical calendar. According to the Universal Norms, "Holy Week is ordered to the commemoration of Christ's Passion, beginning with his Messianic entrance into Jerusalem (31)." Palm Sunday helps us recall the entrance of Christ the Lord into Jerusalem to accomplish his Paschal Mystery. You may have noticed that all the statues, images of the saints, and the crosses throughout the center are covered with a cloth. This practice of the Church is to heighten our senses for the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of the Lord. Perhaps spending some time this week in reading the Passion accounts in each of the Gospels to prepare for the Sacred Triduum. "Since Christ accomplished his work of human redemption and of the perfect glorification of God principally through his Paschal Mystery, in which by dying he has destroyed our death, and by rising restored our life, the sacred Paschal Triduum of the Passion and Resurrection of the Lord shines forth as the high point of the entire liturgical year (Universal Norms, 18-19)." We hope that you will join us this Holy Week and the three days of the Sacred Triduum!

Holy Week Schedule

The most important week in our church calendar is Holy Week. During the various liturgies held that week, our community is invited to relive the last day of Jesus. Our Holy Week schedule will include:

- **Spy Wednesday, 4/13:** Tenebrae Candlelight Mass at 7:30 pm, a candle is extinguished after the reading of each of seven Scripture passages related to the Passion of Jesus
- **Holy Thursday, 4/14:** Feast of the Lord's Supper with washing of the feet at 7:30 pm, then Adoration until midnight.
- **Good Friday, 4/15:** Service of the Lord's Passion at 1:00 pm, then Taizé Prayer Service at 7:30 pm
- **Holy Saturday, 4/16:** Easter Vigil 8:00 pm with reception to follow.
- **Easter Sunday, 4/17:** Normal mass times, including 5 pm Student mass with dinner to follow.
— Easter Egg Hunt to follow the 9 am mass.

Veiled Images and Statues


This week you might notice that many of the religious images, statues, and crucifixes are veiled. As this is the first (or one of the few times) this tradition has been practiced here at Newman, it is also a wonderful opportunity to learn about this custom.

The covering of crosses, statues, and images begins during the 5th week of Lent as a way to heighten our senses and build within us a longing for Easter Sunday. It is a stark reminder that something is different and a reminder to get ready for the Sacred Triduum, the holiest season. It is also a practice that can be done for the "domestic church" – in your families. The crosses will remain covered until the Easter Vigil on the evening of Holy Saturday.

The veiling of images intends to help us to turn our attention away from images toward the words that are said in the liturgies. When you see these coverings, perhaps you might feel as if they are hiding something very beautiful. And there lies the whole point: the veils are not meant to be there forever. The images need to be unveiled; it is unnatural for them to be covered.

The unveiling before the Easter Vigil is a reminder of our own life on earth. We live in a "veiled" world, in our exile from our true home – heaven. It is only through our own death that the veil is lifted, and we are finally able to see the beauty of everything in our lives.
