Diocesan Celebration of the Solemnity of Corpus Christi

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi) will be celebrated on Sunday, June 23. Mass will be celebrated by Bishop Larry at 10:30 am at Co-Cathedral of St. Theresa followed by a Eucharistic Procession to the Cathedral Basilica Our Lady of Peace at 11:45 am. (Bring your own water and sun protection for this approximate 1.5 mile march.)

The celebration will end with Adoration and Benediction at 1:00 pm at the Cathedral Basilica of Our Lady of Peace celebrated by Bishop Larry. With its origins dating back to the mid 13th century, the Feast of Corpus Christi is an ancient and sacred jubilant celebration of the Blessed Sacrament. It is a chance for all believers to focus on the Body of Christ in the Eucharist, and the Body of Christ, the Church. We faithful gather together to express our love and devotion to Jesus Christ, not only to and for ourselves, but on this day, we proclaim it to the entire world!

Fr. Ej and I begin our walking pilgrimage on the Way of St. James in Spain this week. The Way of St. James is the journey that pilgrims take on their way to Santiago de Compostela to visit the tomb of St. James the Apostle. From the 9th century, it became one of the most important pilgrim routes in Europe. There are many routes of the Way but the most common route is the French route which is 500 miles in its entirety and takes about a month to complete. We can't be gone that long. Fr. Ej and I will be walking on the last 100 KM or 62.2 Miles of the French route. That is the minimum walking distance to get the certificate of completion. Blessed John Henry Newman



The Oxford Movement was a controversial group of Anglicans who wished to return the Church of England to Catholic beliefs and liturgical rituals. In 1845 Newman, joined by some but not all of his followers, officially left the Church of England and his teaching post at Oxford University and was received into the Catholic Church. He was quickly ordained a priest, and continued as an influential religious leader. In 1879, he was created a cardinal in recognition of his services to the cause of the Catholic Church in England. He was instrumental in the founding of the Catholic University of Ireland in 1854, although he had left Dublin by 1859. CUI, in time, evolved into University College Dublin, today the largest university in Ireland.

The collection of items will continue through July 2. The recipients are young student parents at UH Manoa who are challenged financially to provide school supplies for their young elementary age children while paying for their own books and supplies.

Helping Hands Hawaii is also supporting SP@Manoa with basic school supplies, so Newman Center and Women's Club Thrift Shop will provide what is not otherwise being supplied.

Our goal this year is based on both the demonstrated need and on the very generous support given last year by Newman Community members. **Thanks to your generosity, we already have enough backpacks, Kindermats, glue sticks, and whiteboard markers.**

Items needed are:

- Clipboard-letter size
- Stainless steel water bottle
- Plastic School Pencil Box
- Watercolor paints with 1 brush & 8 colors
- Protractor, 12" ruler
- Transparent tape, 1/2 inch X 36 yards
- Apron or oversized shirt
- Dry-erase markers (black)
- Hand sanitizer, small bottles
- Sunscreen (stick preferred for individual application)



Next week's items are: protractors, 12" rulers, water bottles, watercolor paints, and clipboards. We will be assembling the back packs and using the donated money to supplement what has been given to meet the goal of 40 filled backpacks.

Living Catholic in the 808
Trinitarian Nature of God
Very Rev. Msgr. Gary L. Secor,

Today, we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity. We thank God that, because we are created in the image and likeness of God, what we see in the trinitarian nature of God is meant to help us understand who God has created us to be.

First of all, the Trinity is a mystery to be revered and not primarily a doctrine to be analyzed. No amount of explaining or figuring will ever fathom the depths of God's nature. In fact, once we think we have God figured out, or "put in a box", we are in trouble. God deserves awe and not analysis. Each person also deserves our reverence and respect. We know from our experience with those who are close to us, that once we think we have them all figured out we are in trouble.

Secondly, the Trinity is a relationship of persons. This tells us that we have a personal God who wants to have a personal relationship with each of us. God does not want to be a distant God. Someone has described God as a vast ocean of love whose tide is constantly coming in and inviting us to be swept off our moorings and into the deeps of grace and mercy. What is keeping us tied to the dock? This personal God also reminds us that it is in other people that we find God's presence and love. God has a human face; it is the face of Christ.

Finally, the Trinity reminds us that real unity is found not in sameness but in oneness in the midst of diversity. All the persons of God are unique, but they are one God. Their individual natures are not violated and they are not in competition with one another. Even though the truth may call us to disagree about the validity or value of certain behaviors, we must not disagree about the respect that each person deserves. The great challenge is to live the values of Christ while valuing one another. Only the love of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit makes that possible.
