

From the desk of the Pastor

“Ten were cleansed, were they not? Where are the other nine? Has none but this foreigner returned to give thanks to God?”

An attitude of gratitude is a key characteristic of being a disciple of Jesus Christ. Our readings this weekend show us the importance of gratitude in the life of a Christian disciple. Both Naaman in the First reading and the Samaritan man in the Gospel offer gratitude for being healed of leprosy. Naaman recognized the great blessing he had received and is moved to worship God for the rest of his life. In a similar way, the one out of the ten healed lepers realized that he received healing from the Lord returned in gratitude and fell in worship. How many times in our lives have we failed to recognize the blessings that we have received? Have we worshipped other gods, including self, for these blessings? The message is clear in our readings today. An attitude of gratitude leads us to worship God who offers us salvation. “Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel, he has come to his people and set them free...”

Let us give thanks to God for the Canonization of St. John Henry Newman, patron saint of Newman Centers! St. John Henry Newman, pray for us!

JOHN HENRY NEWMAN (1801-1890)



John Henry Newman (1801-1890) was beatified on September, 19, 2010. In his address, Pope Benedict XVI recognized Newman's literary contribution as well as his pastoral zeal for the sick, the poor, the bereaved, and those in prison. Today he is being canonized by Pope Frances in Vatican City on October 13, 2019.



Sunday Connection from Loyola Press

Today we hear about how Jesus, continuing on his journey to Jerusalem, heals 10 lepers. This story is a lesson about faith and reminds us that faith is sometimes found in unlikely places. Ten people afflicted



with leprosy cry out to Jesus. Struck with pity, Jesus heals all 10. However, only one is described as glorifying God and returning to thank Jesus. The one who returns is a Samaritan, a foreigner. In the Jewish circles in which Jesus lived, Samaritans were looked down upon because of the differences between the two communities in their observance of Judaism. It is significant, therefore, that Jesus commends the Samaritan for his faith, which has been his salvation. Throughout Luke's Gospel, faith is found in surprising places.

Another lesson for us in this Gospel has to do with salvation. All 10 of the lepers were given the gift of healing, but in his gratitude to God for this gift, the Samaritan found salvation. Our salvation is found in recognizing the gifts we have been given and knowing to whom we must offer our thanks.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Religious Education classes will begin October 13th immediately following the 9 a.m. Mass. Please pick up a registration form and return with a check for \$50 before that date. There are two separate registration forms. The first is for children in grades 1-3 who will make the Sacraments of Initiation next year. This is a two year program with the children making Reconciliation, Confirmation and First Eucharist in spring 2021. Rite of Christian Initiations of Adults

RCIA, the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, is the engagement of adults seeking to know more about Catholicism and possibly become a baptized Catholic, and those who have been baptized in a Christian tradition but who are not fully initiated into the Catholic Faith. Newman Center offers a formal RCIA program of study beginning in September and continuing through Easter until May. It includes weekly reflection on the Liturgy of the Word, discussions on a series of faith-focused topics, shared fellowship about the journey of faith, service to the community, and the basic desire to serve God as we each are called.
