From the desk of the Pastor

This weekend, we learn about the kind of attitude we bring in prayer. Jesus draws a blunt picture in today's Gospel. We have two characters: the Pharisee and the Tax collector. Instead of praising God for His mighty works, the Pharisee congratulates himself for his own deeds, which he presents to God in some detail. "O God, I thank you that I am not like the rest of humanity—greedy, dishonest, adulterous—or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week, and I pay tithes on my whole income." On the other hand, we have the Tax Collector who stands at a distance, too ashamed even to raise his eyes to God. He prays with a humble and contrite heart because he knows that before God no one is righteous, no one has cause to boast. He prays, "O God, be merciful to me a sinner."



Jesus says, if we try to exalt ourselves before the Lord, as the Pharisee does, we will be brought low. This should be a warning to us- not to take pride in our piety, not to slip into the self-righteousness of thinking that we are better than others, that we are "not like the rest of sinful humanity." But rather, have humility by recognizing that all of us are sinners in need of God's mercy. Jesus says, the latter of the two went home justified. His attitude made all the difference.

So, what kind of attitude do we bring with our prayers? When we come to church? When we leave here? When we are at home, school or work? God sees into our hearts and He sees all those hidden forces that have pushed us in one direction or another. God is not concerned with who is better with whom. He is only concerned with how each of us individually respond to His love, what we as individuals has done with the gifts He has given us.

Stewardship Moment



There is an interesting twist we find in today's gospel when we hear Jesus' parable of the Pharisee and the tax collector Stewardship praying in the temple. The Pharisee is "praying to himself." It doesn't mean he was praying silently. It seems to mean

something a lot more troubling, that he is praying to himself; that God is not his prayer's intended audience. The words of the Pharisee are very much centered on himself: he makes claims about his character. He highlights his own admirable activities. Good stewards of their prayer lives know that a prayer of praise and thanksgiving should focus on the goodness of God. Do your prayers of thanksgiving always stay focused on God's unfathomable, immeasurable goodness and generosity?

Sunday Connection from Loyola Press

The second parable that Jesus tells in Luke 18 addresses attitude in prayer. In contrasting the prayer of the Pharisee with the prayer of the tax collector. Jesus teaches his disciples to pray in humility before God. Jesus again surprises his listeners by showing the tax collector as the example of



faith, rather than the Pharisee. Remember that Pharisees were members of a sect of Judaism active in Jesus' time. They taught an oral interpretation of the Law of Moses as the basis for Jewish piety. If anyone would be a model for prayer, a Pharisee was a likely candidate. In contrast, Jesus offers the tax collector as a model for prayer. Tax collectors were collaborators with the Roman authorities in a system that allowed the tax collectors to line their own pockets by charging in excess of the defined taxes. Yet, in this parable. Jesus offers the humility of the tax collector as a model for the prayer of a disciple. The parable reminds us that when we pray, we must remember our need for God in our lives. If we are too full of ourselves, there is too little room for God's grace to work in us.




