From the Desk of the Pastor

"I say to you, offer no resistance to one who is evil. When someone strikes you on your right cheek, turn the other one as well...love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, that you may be children of your heavenly Father...So be perfect, just as your heavenly Father is perfect."

Jesus begins today's Gospel passage by quoting one of the oldest laws in the world— an eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth. In the Code of Hammurabi, which is over two thousand years before Christ, this law exists in its code. If a man has inflicted an injury on any person, an equivalent injury shall be inflicted upon him. Sounds like this law is still valid in our modern world after seeing the news or social media outlets nowadays. But Jesus challenges us to change our ways and take the path of non-resentment and non-retaliation. This of course requires selflessness and intentional discipleship.

How fitting it is that Lent is around the corner. The Lenten Season is an opportunity to live out the challenges that Jesus posed to us these last weeks through prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Please take home and use the Lenten resources we have for you and join us in the different activities this season...

Winter Cold and Flu Season

As always, you are reminded to use common sense in the reception of Holy Communion from the chalice during the annual cold and flu season. If you are feeling ill or think you may have been exposed to a virus, you should refrain from partaking of the Blood of Christ from the communal chalice.



In the same way, you should refrain from offering your hand to others at the sign of peace. A smile and a heartfelt "Peace be with you" should suffice. Likewise if you are not comfortable sharing the sign of peace or receiving Holy Communion from the communal chalice for fear of infection, you should feel no pressure to do so.

All of us must be aware of such sensitive matters in the intimate life of the Christian community and we should expect that some will refrain from the sign of peace and the communal chalice out of care for our well being and not out of unkindness or a lack of piety.

Stewardship Moment

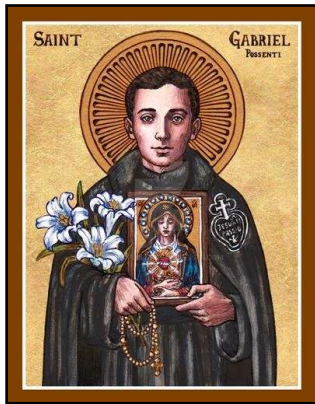
In another passage from his Sermon on the Mount, Jesus continues to turn his disciples' way of thinking upside-down. One of the lessons for the Christian steward in today's Gospel is that if we have a chance to help someone in need, we should be generous and give more than is expected of us. Jesus went "the extra mile" for us. Can we be more like Jesus and "go the extra mile" for others?



St. Gabriel Possenti

(March 1 1838– Feb 27 1862)
Feast Day: Feb 27

The 11th of 13 children of a distinguished Italian lawyer who served the Papal States, Francesco Possenti was a bright, joyful youth, despite losing his mother when he was 4. During his education at the Jesuit college in Spoleto, he was seriously ill twice and vowed to become a religious if he recovered. Although he felt called to serve the Lord through the priesthood, but took his time to act upon this feeling. It was after the death of his favorite sister in 1856 that he entered the Passionist novitiate, taking the name of Gabriel Our Lady of Sorrows. He is known to have been extraordinarily patient and kind, completing all that was expected of him with a bright spirit. Unfortunately, he never reached ordination, as he died of tuberculosis at 24 years old. St. Gabriel Possenti was canonized in 1920 and is the Patron of clerics and youth.

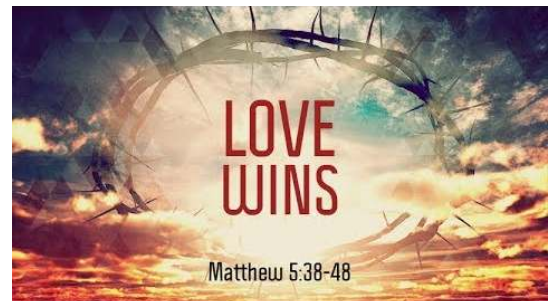

Sunday Connection from Loyola Press

The last two antitheses offered in the Sermon on the Mount deal with love of enemies. We should not look at "an eye for an eye" as an inordinately strict punishment. It is actually meant to limit acts of revenge by making sure the punishment is not excessive but fits the crime. However, Jesus asks his followers to take a different approach by resisting retaliation altogether. The response to a stronger person who slaps us on the cheek, takes us to court, or demands a service of us is not to resist. Similarly, for a weaker person, such as a beggar or borrower, we are to give him or her what he or she asks for. Those who are called to the Kingdom of Heaven are to go beyond the way the world usually works and serve God's kingdom here on earth.

The other difficult demand of those who are called to the kingdom is to embrace the enemy. There is no command in the Old Testament to hate individuals in a personal or vindictive way. But there is a religious stance that calls one to hate evil and to distance oneself from those who participate in evil. In contrast, Matthew emphasizes that love of God and love of neighbor are the fundamental commands on which all else depend. Because God's love is unconditional, we are to strive to love as God does, though, of course, it is challenging. Is it even possible?

The key is in the final verse. We are to be perfect as our heavenly father is perfect. Matthew uses the Greek word *telos*, which is probably better translated here as "complete." We are not to be perfect as in doing everything correctly, that is, as in being absolutely morally correct. We are to be perfect as in striving to reach the completeness we are called to in the Kingdom of Heaven. Attempting to love our enemies is part of striving for that completeness.



Busy Person's Retreat March 7-11, 2020

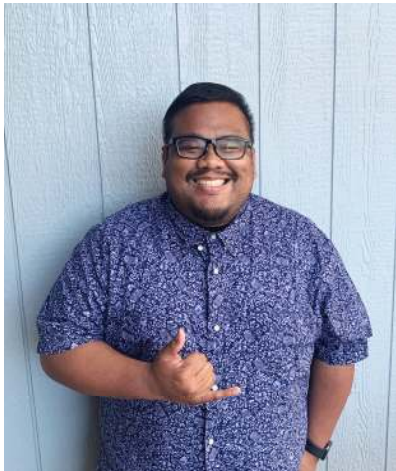
