

A Seminarian Reflection

One of my favorite little things about the Catholic faith is how people tend to sign off on their letters. There's the standard "In Christ," or my favorite "Peace and all good" (or Pax et Bonum). My spiritual director signs off every e-mail with "Trading prayers!" But the strangest one I ever saw was "See you in the Eucharist!"

I assumed this person meant "See you AT the Eucharist" and thought they were just creatively expressing how much they were looking forward to seeing me the following Sunday, and when I mentioned this, they said that they hadn't made a typo, and would see me IN the Eucharist, whether I was actually there at Mass or not.

This was news to me. I was aware that Jesus IS the Eucharist, as the bread and wine become the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Christ. This was very clear to me. But me? IN the Eucharist? How does that work?

When we gather at Mass, we are not simply doing some simple ritual action that we do once a day or once a week that reminds us of something we love and makes us feel good. Rather, we are stepping outside of space and time and joining. The catechism tells us that "the sacrifice of Christ and the sacrifice of the Eucharist are one single sacrifice." (CCC 1367).

Each time we partake in the Eucharist, we are sharing in the same sacrifice that each and every person who has ever made up the "body of Christ" has shared in! Rather than saying "see you later!" we can say "see you in the Eucharist" and know that though we might be separated by physical distance, or even time in the case of our departed loved ones, we can join with our beloved fellow members of the Body of Christ in our partaking of the Eucharist.

My friend told me that they first encountered the phrase "see you in the Eucharist" in a song by a Catholic musician, and so I invite you to take some time in the week to look up the song "See You In The Eucharist" by Danielle Rose. I invite you to listen to the song and reflect on the lyrics and deepen your appreciation for the great gift of Christ's Body and Blood. Happy Feast!

Gospel — Jesus feeds the crowd with five loaves and two fish (Luke 9:11b-17).



THE GIFT OF THE EUCHARIST

Today we hear how Abram encounters Melchizedek, “king of Salem . . . and a priest of God Most High” (Genesis 14:18). Melchizedek appears nowhere else in scripture, but is nonetheless significant. Psalm 110 declares of the great King David, “You are a priest forever, in the line of Melchizedek,” a description later given (in the letter to the Hebrews) to Christ as High Priest.

Early Christians saw in Melchizedek's bread and wine the bread and wine of the Eucharist; Paul's account of the Last Supper (in today's second reading) is the oldest one in scripture. In the Gospel, Luke describes Jesus providing bread for a crowd in words similar to Paul's, words still used by the Church: Jesus takes bread, gives thanks, breaks it. Together, these three readings reveal how Christian priesthood, Christ's Real Presence, and the call to serve those in need are all found in the gift of the Eucharist.

Stewardship Moment

From the rich Eucharistic themes to be drawn from today's second reading, one stewardship theme stands out: The Eucharist is Christ's gift to us. Good stewards are grateful for this gift and realize that no matter their station in life, they are welcome to come to the table and receive the body and blood of Christ. If Jesus could break bread with his betrayer, Judas, his denier, Peter, and the other ten who deserted him, then he will welcome us. Do we truly appreciate what a tremendous gift it is to approach the Lord's table? Do we realize that the Holy Spirit means to transform us by the gift of Christ's body and blood?



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Family Connection

In our age of fast food and eating on the go, families often find that they are not eating meals together at a dinner table. As a family, look back over the past week and recall how many meals were eaten together and how many meals were eaten alone or on the run.

In the Bible, meals are seen as much more than a means to satisfy a physical need. The Hebrew people viewed eating a meal as a way of expressing and strengthening their relationship to one another under God's covenant. It is no coincidence that meals are often the setting of Jesus' teaching and miracles in the Gospels. In this Sunday's Gospel, we hear the story of Jesus feeding the crowd of 5,000 people.

Read this Sunday's Gospel, Luke 9:11b-17. Talk about the kinds of hungers that people have in addition to physical hunger. Describe the hungers that a family nourishes (love, compassion, forgiveness, laughter, and so on). Together give thanks for the food that Jesus gives us that we celebrate on this Sunday's feast of the Body and Blood of Jesus. Make a commitment to share in this Eucharistic meal together as a family.

Generous and Loving Creator, you have called us to Malama i ka Makana (Cherish the Gift).

As disciples of your Son, we ask that your Spirit open our minds and hearts to more deeply appreciate your countless blessings. We pray this through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen





How to make the feast of Corpus Christi come alive in your family

Belief in the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist is a great gift to pass along to your children.

The feast of Corpus Christi always make me think of my father. He joined the Church almost 30 years ago and I vividly recall — about the time I was 12 or 13 — asking Dad what finally convinced him to convert. (It was one of the many serious conversations I've had with my father; conversations like this have always been a normal part of our relationship.) Raised in a Christian home, he decided to become a Catholic after five years of marriage to my mother. In the end it's certainly Mom who deserves most of the credit for his conversion. However, one moment stands out for Dad as "the moment" when he came to believe in the Eucharist, and with that entered the Church.

When Dad was wrestling with his last doubts about joining the Church, he was discussing the nature of the Eucharist with a parish priest. Dad was objecting to the Real Presence, doubting the possibility that the host could really become the Body of Christ. Fr. Tim gently countered my dad's objections. He asked my father, "Todd, do you believe that God is all-powerful?" My Dad said yes. Fr. Tim continued on, "Do you believe that God, who is all-powerful, could work a miracle whenever he wants?" My Dad said yes. "So," Fr. Tim continued, "what's to stop you from thinking that God, who is all-powerful, could miraculously turn bread into his body every Sunday?" That was what Dad needed. For my part, I can honestly say that I've never seriously doubted in the Real Presence. At that age typically marked by uncertainty and suspicion, I heard my dad's account of his own belief. My father told me that he thought the Sacred Host was Jesus. That was what I needed. What could be a more precious gift to hand on to your son or daughter?

To make Corpus Christi come alive in your home, here are some ideas:

ATTEND A PROCESSION

Change your regular Mass schedule and go to Mass in order to attend a procession that day.

GO TO EUCHARISTIC ADORATION OR VISIT A CHURCH

Again, visiting another parish or Adoration Chapel could be a little Corpus Christi pilgrimage. Spend a few moments in prayer with your family.

READ THE LAST SUPPER OR JOHN 6

The Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke each narrate the Last Supper (Mt. 26:17–30, Mk. 14:12–26, Lk. 22:7–39).

PRAY A LITANY OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT

In my parish ministry, I've found that praying litanies works very well with families. Adults and older children can read the invocations, and younger children can join in on the responses. Litanies often contain beautiful images, which are worth discovering and teaching to your family.

PREPARE A SMALL ALTAR IN YOUR HOME

Place a crucifix to represent Christ at the center, then decorate with candles and flowers.

Reflect

"Every day is a blessing. So, count your blessings!" These were the words my grandmother would repeat to me during the short time she stayed with us in Hawai'i. The word "bless" or "blessings" would be in almost every single one of her sentences or phrases. She would often kiss our foreheads to "bless" us first thing in the morning and right before we closed our eyes for bed.

We are blessed. We are truly blessed people. God continues to shower our lives with countless blessings. Today we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, aka "Corpus Christi Sunday." We are reminded of the ultimate blessing of God through His Son, Jesus, who continuously feeds us in mind, body, and soul. Let us continue to share in thanksgiving and remember Jesus in the Eucharist.

We honor, remember, and celebrate all fathers today as we celebrate Fathers' Day. Through the intercession of St. Joseph, the foster father of Jesus, we pray for all fathers, both living and deceased. Happy Fathers' Day!
