

From the Desk of the Pastor

"Lord, you are truly the Savior of the world; give me living water, that I may never thirst again."

On this Third Sunday of Lent, we hear two passages about being thirsty. In the first reading, the Israelites grumbled to Moses about being thirsty. They would rather live under slavery in Egypt than to die of thirst in the desert. Their hearts were hardened by the hardships they were going through. They tested the Lord and even doubted his presence in their midst. They thought he abandoned them in the desert to die. However, the Lord did not disappoint, and he gave them water to drink from a rock. God told Moses to strike a rock with his staff and water will flow from it. The mighty power of God was made manifest when Moses struck the rock. The second passage that we hear about thirst is in the Gospel. Jesus goes to the well of Jacob where he meets a Samaritan woman. He tells her, "Give me a drink." But Jesus wasn't speaking about a physical thirst. He was speaking about his thirst for souls. He longed to give the Samaritan woman the living waters of eternal life. Jesus says, "Whoever drinks the water I shall give will never thirst." As the Word of God is being made manifest to the Samaritan woman, the conversation is no longer about wells, cisterns, and water. Instead, living waters, true worship, and eternal life. The Samaritan woman had an encounter that would change her life forever. Today, the living waters that flow from the true rock of salvation. Jesus, is offered to us. This Lenten season gives us an opportunity to examine our lives deeper and challenges us to not harden our hearts like the Israelites. We have several more weeks of Lent left, let us utilize this time to come back to the Lord with all our hearts and drink from the living waters that flow from his resurrected body. So that like the Samaritan woman, we can bear and spread the good news to the whole world!



GOD EVER PURSUES US

We hear today of God's unrelenting pursuit of us. Our readings tell stories of God's intense desire to share the divine life with us. From Exodus, we see how God shows endless persistence and compassion, even to those who grumble against God, or seem to have forgotten God. From the Gospel of John, we hear of how Jesus, in his extended conversation with the Samaritan woman, gives her dignity, names uncomfortable truths, and gradually leads her into a new path of faith. We can have confidence that as we bring our own confusions, fears, and failings to God, we may receive God's mercy and forgiveness. God always persists and continually finds new ways to invite people into unity with God. As Paul describes in Romans, in the cross we see how God will go to any length to demonstrate the depth and breadth of divine love.

Family Connection

Lent is a season for repentance. It is a season during which we are called to reflect upon and to live deeply the promises of Baptism. The well and the conversation about water immediately recall for us the Sacrament of Baptism. As the Samaritan woman was converted and sent on a mission because of the conversation about water, we too are converted and sent by our Baptism to preach the good news of Jesus to others.

Take this opportunity to reflect upon the importance of Baptism with your family. If you have photos or other mementos of your family's Baptisms, bring them out and take some time to recall the day of Baptism and its importance to you and your family. Create a prayer table that includes these mementos and a bowl of holy water. After you have spent some time talking about Baptism, invite everyone to listen carefully and prayerfully to today's Gospel. Read John 4:5-42 together. Ask how Jesus' meeting with the woman at the well is like Baptism. (Jesus knows the woman's sin and forgives her. The woman comes to know Jesus as the Messiah. The woman invites others to meet Jesus.) Pray a prayer of blessing for each member of the family that God will help each one live the promises of his or her Baptism. Pray together the Lord's Prayer.



Stewardship Moment

Jesus' longest-recorded conversation with anyone is the one he has with the Samaritan woman at the well. She discovers she can be honest with Jesus and goes and tells others about him. She gives witness. She's not the most certain, thorough or even convincing witness. But her witness is enough. It is inviting, humble, non-judgmental and sincere. What is the quality of our witness? How do our words and actions give daily testimony on behalf of Christ? During this season of Lent, how might we do a better job at proclaiming the risen Lord in word and deed?


service to others and generous giving.





DAY 1: SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 17- BEGINNING OUR PILGRIMAGE Depart Honolulu for Lisbon. Meals will be served aloft

DAY 2: MONDAY SEPTEMBER 18 - ARRIVE LISBON

Upon arrival at the Lisbon Airport we are met by our tour escort and transferred by private motorcoach to Fatima. Dinner and overnight at our hotel.

DAY 3: TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 19 - FATIMA

DAY 4: WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 20 - FATIMA

After a Buffet Breakfast our free day is dedicated to religious activities. We can participate in the Candlelight Procession again. Dinner and overnight at our hotel.

DAY 5: THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 21- FATIMA/LISBON/TEL AVIV

After our Buffet Breakfast we transfer by private motorcoach to Lisbon for our flight to Tel Aviv. Upon our in arrival in Tel Aviv we will be met by your representative and transferred to our accommodations in Netanya where our dinner will be served.

DAY 6: FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 22 - NAZARETH: THE HOME TOWN OF JESUS

"He will be called a Nazarene." Matthew 2:23 Breakfast. We make our way to Cana, site of Jesus' first miracle at the wedding feast; here we invite couples to renew their wedding vows. Proceed to Nazareth the home town of Jesus, where we visit the Basilica of the Annunciation

where we visit the basilitization are Amunication for Mass, then continue to the Church of 5t Joseph built over the carpentry workshop of St Joseph. We visit Mary's Well a spring is located in the center of downtown Nazareth. According to a tradition, this was the place where angel Gabriel announced to Virgin Mary that she will give birth to the son of God. "And she took the pitcher, and went out to fill it with water...". Our final stop is the site of the Transfiguration at Mt. Tabor. We return to our hotel in Tiberias for dinner and overnight. (B.D)

DAY 7: SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 23 — JESUS'S Journeys Around Galilee

"Jesus left Nazareth and made his h Capernaum by the sea" Matt 4:13. In the morning we drive to Caesarea Philippi Jesus announced he would establish a



church and gave authority over it to the apostle Simon church and gave authority over it to the apostie simon — whom he renamed Peter. We return to the Sea of Galilee and enjoy a boat ride on the Sea of Galilee. We prayer and sing along as we sail the peaceful waters of the Sea of Galilee. At a nearby museum, we will visit a replica of a fishing boat from the time of Christ. Our visit continues to the Mt. of Beatitudes to gain a panoramic value of the Sea of Calilea. view of the Sea of Galilee. The bible teaches that Jesus climbs a hill near En Tabgha and teaches how to be blessed by God the 'Sermon on the Mount'. From there we will visit Capernaum where Jesus began his Galilean ministry, visiting the synagogue which dates to the time of Jesus and the site of Peter's home. We will visit Tabg! where it is believed that Jesus fed the crowd of 5,000 and the nearby Church of the Primacy of Saint Peter commemorating Jesus' reinstatement of Peter as chief apostle. Here we see the altar built upon a cliff known in Latin as Mensa Christi, the Table of Christ, where the resurrected Jesus prepared bread and fishes over a fire for his disciples. we return to our hotel for dinner and overnight (B.D)

DAY 8: SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 24 - FROM GALILEE TO BETHLEHEM

"I rejoiced when I heard them say: Let us go the house of the Lord" Psalm 122 Breakfast and check out. From Galilee you travel along the

fertile Jordan Valley where Jesus walked with His disciples, we stop at first at the baptismal site on the banks of the Jordan River- Qasr al-Yahud- the traditional baptism spot on the Jordan River. Here we renew our baptismal yows Thereafter we arrive in Jericho, being the normal route from Galilee to Jerusalem, Jesus passed through it several times. We will see the traditional sycamore tree of Zacchaeus & view Mt. Temptation. We stop at the Dead Sea for optional float in the Salty waters. Check in dinner and overnight in Bethlehem (B.D)

DAY 9: MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 25- BETHLEHEM

"Ye shall find the babe wrapped in in a manger" Luke 2:12

Breakfast and checkout. we drive to The Shepherd's Fields the location where the Shepherds sited the Star of Nativity before venturing to visit Jesus then we continue the oldest churches in the world, where it all began; The Church of The Nativity, the birthplace of Jesus. A huge church with a long history of religious significance, you will be able to see the various chapels of the Catholic, Armenian and Greek Orthodox Christians. We will visit the caves and the Grotto of the Manger. In the evening we drive to Jerusalem; check in, dinner and overnight the hotel for dinner and overnight.

Stay here and keep watch with me" (Matthew 26:36-39).

We begin this day with a ride the Mt. of Olives, a prominent site in the life of Jesus. Here Jesus taught his pupils, and where Jesus wept over Jerusalem, and where Jesus says "My soul is overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death. Stay here and keep watch with me." (Mathew 26:36-39). We gain a panoramic view of the old City of Jerusalem from the top of the mountain and visit the place of the Ascension, Pater Noster (commemorating the "Our Father"), Dominus Flevit, (where Jesus wept over Jerusalem). At the foot of the mountain, stands the Church of All Nations in the Garden of Gethsemane. Thereafter we stop at the Walling Wall and the Temple Mount. We enjoy lunch on our own then we visit Mt Zion, also called Sion, in Old Testament. We visit the Upper Room commemorating the Last Supper of Jesus and his disciples, and the coming of the Holy Spirit on the disciples. We continue onto the Church of the Dormition of Our Lady The location is identified in Christian tradition as the place where the Virgin Mary died — or "fell asleep." We begin this day with a ride the Mt. of Olives, a prominent as the place where the Virgin Mary died — or "fell asleep." Finally, we visit the Church of St Peter in Gallicantu, (Latin for 'cockcrow') back to the hotel for dinner and overnight.

DAY 11: WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 27 - JERUSALEM OLD CITY — THE HOLY SEPULCHRE & FREE TIME

"Behold the Man!" John 19:5
Breakfast. We Enter the Old City of Jerusalem through St.
Stephen's Gate to visit the Crusader Church of St. Anne, the
best-preserved Crusader church in Jerusalem, marking the
traditional site of the home of Jesus' maternal grandparents,
Anne and Joachim, and the birthplace of the Virgin Mary.
We observe the nearby The Ecco Home ("Behold the Man")
Arch leasted at the beginning of the Virgin Polegor. Tradition Arch, located at the beginning of the Via Dolorosa. Tradition holds that this was where Pilate pronounced judgment on Jesus. Then we gather at the Antonia Palace to walk the Via Jesus. Then we gather at the Antonia Palace to walk the Via Dolorosa, the Way of the Cross or the Way of Suffering, where nearly 2000 years ago Jesus of Nazareth carried his cross to his crucifixion. We conclude the Via Dolorosa at the site of Calvary for Mass at the Crusader's Chapel in the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. We take a moment here to reflect about the sorrows of Jesus and to repent our own sins. And he said to him, "Truly, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise." We enjoy a guided tour of the Holy Sepulcher and the Empty Tomb. The rest of the day is free to explore on your own. Finally we enjoy dinner at local restaurant and drive to Ben Gurion Airport for our flight back home.

DAY 12: THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 28 -END OF OUR PILGRIMAGE-

Arrive early in the morning and continue home -the end of a most enjoyable journey.

We invite you to come with us and visit the places where the history of our salvation was played out, the places where Jesus taught and worked His signs, where He offered Himself in sacrifice, where He rose and ascended. We are excited at the opportunity to visit Fatima, Portugal and the Holy Land and to share with you the wonder and the power of these holy places.

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Pray

The prayer that will make us cling to God Fr. Peter John Cameron, OP - published on 03/05/23

My nothingness must kneel below Thy Cross ...

Jesus commends the tax collector in the Temple (Lk 18:9-14): This man went home justified. The Lord praises him because the man prayed: O God, be merciful to me, a sinner. He prayed the prayer of contrition.

The Catechism defines contrition as "sorrow of the soul and detestation for the sins committed, together with the resolution not to sin again" (1451).

Facing the horror of our sins may be the most difficult thing imaginable. But, as the Catholic author George Bernanos reassures us, by contrition we enter within ourselves only to die to sin, "and that is where God awaits us." Or as the poet Rainer Maria Rilke put it, "It's here in all the pieces of my shame / that now I find myself again."

Keep in mind: To possess the knowledge of our sins is to be blessed with a precious grace God grants as a gift. No matter how distressing and off-putting it may feel, that knowledge is power. Because it is in the very knowledge of how lost and miserable we are as a result of our sins that God desires to bind ourselves to himself. For if God is the one who enables us to see the truth of our sinfulness—with all its shame and humiliation and repulsion—then God even more gives us the grace through that awareness to cling to him. St. Augustine counsels us well: "Let us never assume that if we live good lives we will be without sin; our lives should be praised only when we continue to beg for pardon."

Here's an effective way to adapt the tax collector's prayer. Recite the main part of the prayer—Lord Jesus Christ, Son of the living God, have mercy on me a sinner—and then stick on one of your actual sins: ...have mercy on me a sinner: selfish. Do that over and over until you run out of sins: ...have mercy on me a sinner: impatient...envious...angry...ungrateful. If I want to stay at prayer for a long, long time, that's how I pray.

The grace of contrition is captured in a moving way by Catholic World War I war poet Siegfried Sassoon:

Bring no assurance of redeemed rest, no intimation of awarded grace.
Only contrition, cleavingly confessed to Thy forgiving face.
I ask one world of everlasting loss in all I am, that other world to win.
My nothingness must kneel below Thy Cross.
There let new life begin.

Lent is a perfect time to take an inventory of your spiritual life

Take advantage of the Lenten season by looking over your life, discovering your strengths and weaknesses.

Lent presents to us a unique time of the year when we are invited to look inside ourselves and at our spiritual lives, discovering the good and bad that is there.

If we are to be completely honest with ourselves, we will notice many areas that need growth and improvement. This can often be difficult for us, as we may not always want to see our faults and failings.

However, it is important to take a spiritual inventory during Lent, as it gives us an opportunity to reconcile ourselves with God.

Pope Benedict XVI recommended this practice in his message for Lent in 2011.


[T]he Lenten journey, in which we are invited to contemplate the Mystery of the Cross, is meant to reproduce within us "the pattern of his death" (Ph 3: 10), so as to effect a deep conversion in our lives; that we may be transformed by the action of the Holy Spirit, like St. Paul on the road to Damascus;

that we may firmly orient our existence according to the will of God; that we may be freed of our egoism, overcoming the instinct to dominate others and opening us to the love of Christ.

The Lenten period is a favorable time to recognize our weakness and to accept, through a sincere inventory of our life, the renewing Grace of the Sacrament of Penance, and walk resolutely towards Christ.

For some of us, this spiritual inventory will be more difficult to endure, as we already know our weaknesses and fear that more light upon our sins will lead us into despair.

The good news is that God reaches out to us in his mercy, ready to accept us into his loving arms. We need not be afraid of our failings, as God is ready to pick us up and set us on the right path.





Reflect

When I was in high school, I volunteered at a local hospital during summer break. I was first assigned to assist a veteran unit secretary who had worked in that unit for over 30 years. I was excited to meet and help people. Upon entering the unit corridor, the unit secretary was there to welcome me. Or so I thought. Instead of greeting me, she questioned one item around my neck - my crucifix necklace. She went on to badger me on how I would have the audacity to wear something like that around my neck. This person told me that wearing a cross with Jesus' dead body on it was sacrilegious and emphasized how ashamed I should be for being disrespectful in displaying that around my neck for everyone to see. I was so embarrassed and wanted to just disappear at that moment. She continued to go on and on, and I just stood there, bearing all the horrible things she was shouting at me. After 30 minutes of what seemed like a long scolding and lecture, I softly said, "Thank you," and left to call my dad to pick me up.

I went home and I cried for the rest of the day. I prayed so many rosaries that night, asking our Blessed Mother to pray for that lady, to forgive her for saying all those bad things to me and to bring peace to her heart. The following week, I gathered up all my courage and strength to go back and give that day a piece of my mind. As I got off the elevator, there she was. And she grabbed my hands, apologizing over and over, and said how sorry she was for her words and actions. She went on to mention that she had just lost her husband the night before, and I happened to be wearing a crucifix very similar to his, and she had lost it right then and there. We were both in tears and embraced each other.

In today's Gospel, we hear about the Samaritan woman at the well. This story teaches us about change of heart. In this beautiful conversation between Jesus and the woman, which by the way was not allowed and unacceptable, there is a transformation of the heart with the Samaritan woman. We are not defined by our sins, but by our heart. We are called to come back to God. Yes, there are times when we stumble and fall. But it is through God's love that we are lifted to walk hand in hand with Him. Our baptism is our call to mission to live out our lives as disciples. Opportunities of evangelization are necessary as we are called to tell the Good News. It could change someone's life. May our continued Lenten journey invite us to look into our hearts, that we may be loving and forgiving to our brothers and sisters in Christ, and that we continue to share that love to the whole world!
