

From the Desk of the Pastor

"Let all the earth cry out to God with joy."

On this sixth Sunday of Easter, our readings remind us that God must come first in our lives, and that love of God shows itself in concrete actions — this is precisely why the stewardship way of life is so necessary.

Our second reading, from St. Peter, challenges us to, "Sanctify Christ as Lord in your hearts." In other words, we are to put Christ first above all else in our lives. His role is not merely as Savior of our lives, as significant as that role is — He is to be "Lord" of our lives as well. As His disciples, we are called to make Him ruler of all aspects of our lives — our time, talent, and treasure.

The beauty of the stewardship way of life is that it offers us a concrete means to show that Christ truly is Lord of our lives, to "prove" our love, in a manner of speaking, because true love is not a mere sentiment. "Whoever has my commandments and observes them is the one who loves me," Jesus tells us in our Gospel passage from John.

True love is an act of the will. It requires obedience to all of God's commandments. This requires courage, humility, and deep trust in Him.

But the rewards of this kind of love are indescribably wonderful. Christ tells us Himself, "Whoever loves me will be loved by my Father, and I will love him and reveal myself to him."

Could there be anything more satisfying to live in such a way that the God of the universe is pleased to reveal more and more of Himself to us?

LIVING THE LITURGY

We see signs of new life all around us during this season. Pope Benedict has called us as Catholics to become more aware in our care and stewardship for the environment.

How does your family or church act as a good steward for the environment? Do you recycle and reuse? Do you pass along things you no longer need? How else can you take the responsibility to heart?

In the reading from Acts, the early Church is extending Christ's message to the Gentiles, reaching outside of the community of the Jews. Does God call you to bring the Good News to people or places that are outside of your comfort zone?

Read Psalm 66. Create a prayer like this psalm, proclaiming the deeds God has done for you. What would you say?

SHARING FAITH

The Spirit is meant to be a force that nurtures yet challenges. How is the Spirit prodding or leading you?

What gifts does God invite you to offer to others through your life, work, ministry, or service?

As the solemnity of Pentecost approaches, what part will you allow the Spirit to play in your life?

SCRIPTURE

The words in a thesaurus entry for advocate are plentiful and rich: believer, sponsor, supporter, and backer. An advocate is also one who offers encouragement and favor. These are exhilarating words for followers of Jesus Christ. There is someone who as we attempt to follow and live our lives as disciples will aid us in this work, offer support and encouragement and act by our side.

The work that disciples are called to fulfill is the work of the Father that Jesus began by proclaiming the kingdom of God. Jesus tells his followers they are to keep his commandments and that the Advocate will be the Spirit of truth. But a warning is there. Just as the truth that Jesus preached was rejected by some, so, too, this truth will be unacceptable. But followers will be able to remain faithful with the Advocate's help if they obey God's commands. God's love and compassion will surround the faithful as they bear witness to this same love and faithfulness of God to the world.

Family Connection

The mystery of the Trinity can be difficult for us to grasp. Today's Gospel invites us to consider how the three persons—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit work together so that God's salvation is made known to us. Jesus' mission is continued through the activity of the Holy Spirit in the lives of his disciples. We have received this same Spirit through our Baptisms. The Spirit, living and working within us, reveals the mystery of God's love for us. Just as the first disciples were not left orphaned, we are not orphaned; we remain in God's embrace through the gift of the Holy Spirit.

Gather your family and invite each family member to say what he or she knows about the Holy Spirit. Read aloud today's Gospel, John 14:15-21. What does Jesus say the Holy Spirit will do for the disciples? Through the gift of the Holy Spirit, we come to share in the love of God made known to us in Jesus. Pray together, thanking God for this gift of the Holy Spirit by praying the Prayer to the Holy Spirit.

STEWARDSHIP MOMENT

Philip understood very well Jesus' words: "If you love me, you will keep my commandments." We learn of Philip's devotion to prayer, evangelizing and healing in the region of Samaria; made up of communities that would not be very receptive to the followers of Jesus. Philip is a model steward, living his discipleship day by day in the Lord without being obstructed by feelings of what cost his actions might entail. Good stewards summon the courage to proclaim the Lord and to serve Him by ministering to others. As an Easter people, eager to rejoice in the Lord, it is important to reflect on how we are living out our own commitment to discipleship.

In Jesus name, we pray. Amen.



St. Anne has been known for centuries for her powerful intercession, especially for mothers, child care workers and those experiencing infertility.


According to legendary stories, Anne was infertile for many years, until she finally conceived and gave birth to the Virgin Mary.

Relying on God and asking for help: Finding the Christian way Cecilia Pigg - published on 05/09/23

Self-reliance can be called ungodly because none of us can accomplish anything without ${\sf God.}$

"Hey, I heard you are sick on top of being newly pregnant. Could I watch your kids some afternoon this week for you?" I texted her with a sigh, knowing what her answer would be already. I have tried to help this friend out over the few years we've known each other, and she always gently refuses my offers.

My phone vibrated a couple of hours later, and I checked it. Sure enough, she texted back something lighthearted and funny while denying my help. I groaned out loud in frustration. For some reason, this time it really got to me, and I started monologuing to myself. "Why won't she let me help her? She's not superhuman! She has helped me countless times with errands and child-care, and I just can't get over that she won't accept my help. Maybe it is personal, like she just dislikes or is uncomfortable with me helping her? It could be that."

As I started to settle into a stewing session over why she would keep rejecting me, a shot of grace inoculated me. I realized that I also rarely accept people's help, and that perhaps I have made others feel this way too. Ugh, now instead of being able to just blame my friend for her failings, or nurse my hurt pride as I made excuses for her, I had to do some self-examination of my own.

I thought back to a Bible study I had been a part of. That was the first time I heard the phrase "ungodly self-reliance" and when I heard it, I cringed. That phrase described a huge motivating force within me. I hate the thought that I'm inconveniencing someone, and work to avoid that at all costs. It turns out though, that asking people for help (in my mind, "inconveniencing them") is pretty crucial in building relationships.

The Bible study had talked about how self-reliance can be called ungodly because none of us can accomplish anything without God. If we don't learn that we are dependent on God, we don't think to pursue a relationship with him. This bleeds into all of our other relationships too. I notice this in my friendships and marriage and even in my parenting.

My marriage doesn't work well when I refuse to rely on my husband, and try to do everything myself. He feels hurt and/or I feel resentful, and our relationship suffers. My friendships stay superficial when I refuse to be vulnerable, and superficial friendships don't help me much when I want to be able to feel known and connected. I watch when my kids think they can do something on their own, and then get hurt because what they are trying to tackle is too big for them without my help.

I want to finish this by writing about how I'm getting better at asking for help. Unfortunately, I really haven't made much progress in this area of my life. I still have a hard time accepting help when other people freely offer it to me, and am nowhere near being adept at reaching out of my own accord when I am struggling. I know that, like everything in life, I need to take baby steps to form a new habit. The more I reach out and stretch my "ask for help" muscle, the easier it will become.

St. Basil the Great said, "O sinner be not discouraged but have recourse to Mary in all your necessities. Call her to your assistance." So, in his footsteps in this month of May, I pray, "Mary, teach me how to ask for help!"
