
NEWMAN CENTER Holy Spirit Parish

From the Desk of the Pastor

"I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world."

Today, we celebrate the Feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (originally called Corpus Christi or the Body of Christ). Since the Second Vatican Council, the emphasis of this feast is on the celebration of the Eucharist. Previously, the emphasis was on the Blessed Sacrament reserved in the tabernacle and exposed for adoration by the faithful. In the Catechism, it says that "the Eucharist is the efficacious sign and sublime cause of that communion in the divine life and that unity of the People of God by which the Church is kept in being. It is the culmination both of God's action sanctifying the world in Christ and of the worship (people) offer to Christ and through him to the Father in the Holy Spirit (par. 1325)." In the Collect or Opening Prayer of the Mass, we acknowledge that we revere the sacred mysteries of the Body and Blood of Christ, and that through this sacrament, we experience in ourselves the fruits of redemption. Our regular partaking of the Body and Blood of Christ in the Eucharist strengthens us for the journey to heaven and draws us to communion with others as brother and sisters in Christ. This year's feast marks the beginning of the Parish Year of the National Eucharistic Revival. The whole mission of the revival is to renew the Church by enkindling a living relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist. During the Parish Year, we will focus our efforts to reinvigorate worship, create moments of personal encounter, engage in robust formation, and send you forth as missionaries. Let us pray for the success of this year!

Family Connection

Our faith teaches us that when we gather to celebrate Mass, Jesus is present to us. The bread and wine truly become the Body and Blood of Christ. This is what we mean by the word transubstantiation: Jesus makes himself present to all who receive the Body and Blood of Christ.

If there are children in your family who have already celebrated their First Holy Communion, invite them to share their memories of this special day. If there are family photos taken on this occasion, bring them out and share them together. Adults in the family may also share memories or photos that they have of their First Communion. Then read together today's Gospel, John 6:51 -58. Reflect together on what Jesus means when he calls himself the "living bread." Recall that every time we receive the Eucharist, Jesus keeps the promise he made in today's Gospel—those who eat his flesh and drink his blood will remain forever connected to him. Perhaps family members can share what it means for them to receive Jesus in the Eucharist. Together thank God for this gift of Holy Communion. Pray together the Lord's Prayer or today's Psalm.

STEWARDSHIP MOMENT

Among the compelling Eucharistic themes proclaimed in today's readings is the notion of "participation" as found in Saint Paul's letter to the Corinthians. Good stewards are part of a Eucharistic family: loving, welcoming, serving. An important part of living as a steward comes about in the many ways we can participate in the life of the Church. No matter how much time we have to give, no matter what our skills or interests, no matter what our level of commitment, there is a way to participate as a good steward to enrich our lives and the lives of others to build up the Body of Christ. How do you participate in the life of your parish?

The 9 simplest ways for Catholics to grow in faith

If you're wanting to deepen your faith, look no further than these useful ways to help.

Sometimes it's a little hard — and even a little daunting — trying to deepen your faith, while also trying to manage the hectic lifestyles we tend to lead.

So to help you try and focus on faith a little more, here is the only to-do list you really need to consider. And remember, as with all to-do lists, it can take a long time for everything to get crossed off, so don't panic if you can't achieve this as quickly as you'd like — baby steps all the way!

Go to Mass each Sunday

This might seem obvious, but sometimes there can be an event that stops you from going to church. Make sure your Sunday priorities start with Mass, and everything else can fall into line afterwards.

Grow

Monthly confession

Going to confession can help you grow close to your Heavenly Father, as it's not just about confessing sins, it's about seeking His mercy, receiving it, and remembering that God loves you unconditionally. And afterwards you'll feel that little bit lighter and ready to embrace all life has to offer.

Daily prayers

Now if you find it difficult to set time aside each day for prayers, then there are ways to incorporate prayers into your daily life without you neglecting other important duties. For example, if you're in traffic, then you can always take the time to pray, and while you're at it, you could also ask for a safe journey! Still, though, nothing will ever replace a set time for God each day. Try to work toward it little by little.

Reading

There are so many books that are great for Catholics. The Bible itself is in a category all its own as the Word of God. But beyond that, there are so many types of spiritual reading, from the Catechism to books from saints that can inspire you in your daily life, and even books that demonstrate love and kindness.

Perform a daily act of mercy

There are Corporal and Spiritual Acts of Mercy that you can easily carry out in your day, that won't take up too much time. From trying to forgive those who've wronged you, to offering food to those in need.

Read Daily Mass readings

This might be tricky if you feel overwhelmed and pushed for time, but it's something you can work up to. The readings said at Mass each day are available on the Internet and on apps, such as Hallow.

Pray the Rosary

Praying the Rosary might be a little time-consuming, but you could start with praying just a decade. Then over time, build it up and before you'll know it you'll be reaching out to Our Lady on a daily basis.

Show gratitude

You can pray, and offer your help, but it's also important to take stock of everything you have. You can practice daily gratitude, in which you consider all the things you are grateful for in that day. You could either write them in a journal, or just think about it in your prayers. But once you appreciate everything you have, you'll certainly grow in faith.

Join your local Catholic community

It's lovely to grow in faith with other members of your parish or Catholic community. If you're not able to physically get out and about, you can join groups online that suit your particular needs.





Back in 2020, right at the start of the Covid-19 pandemic, I had the privilege of participating in a wonderful project called "The Hawai'i Blessing," led by Hawaiian Island Ministries. Here is some background information about the project:
