

From the Desk of the Pastor

"Blessed are you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth; for you have revealed to little ones the mysteries of the kingdom."

The stewardship way of life could be described as a daily pursuit of the kingdom of heaven. In our Gospel passage from Matthew today, Jesus employs three parables to describe this kingdom.

In the first of today's parables, our Lord reminds us that living for Him and for His kingdom will be costly. But the deep joy that comes in following Him makes the "price" entailed worth it. Jesus says, "The kingdom of heaven is like a treasure buried in a field which a person finds and hides again, and out of joy goes and sells all that he has and buys that field." Next, He says the kingdom of heaven is "like a merchant searching for fine pearls. When he finds a pearl of great price, he goes and sells all he has and buys it."

In each of these stories, the kingdom of heaven is somewhat "hidden." We must intentionally search for it amidst the noise of the world that bombards us. Yet, our Lord reminds us that His Kingdom is meant for everyone and He wants us to find it! He says, "It is like a net thrown into the sea which collects fish of every kind."

But Jesus concludes His teaching with a rather ominous image, reminding us that every "fish" will also be judged as good or bad. "The angels will go out and separate the wicked from the righteous and throw them into the fiery furnace." This is a description that is difficult to forget. Clearly Jesus wants to get our attention.

Let us pray for the wisdom to recognize the kingdom of heaven in our midst and intensify our efforts to pursue it starting right now. There is no time to lose, and we will obtain the immeasurable joy that only comes when we live as disciples of Jesus.

Family Connection

Like the person who found the buried treasure and the merchant who acquired the pearl of great price, we seek to find the signs of the kingdom of heaven in our lives. In fact, we even work to bring about God's kingdom in our actions and in our words. We pray that our family values reflect our pursuit of the kingdom of heaven. As Jesus' disciples, we place everything we value in the service of the pursuit of the Kingdom of God.

As you gather as a family, talk about what your family values. Make a list together of those things that your family considers most important, such as family, friends, faith, trust, and love. Place this list before you as you read today's Gospel in its shorter form, Matthew 13:44-46. In these parables, Jesus teaches us that it is worth giving up even valuable things in order to possess the kingdom of heaven. Look at the list your family made and talk about how these things are important to the kingdom of heaven. What has your family given up to make these values important in your life? As Jesus' disciples, we place everything we value in the service of the pursuit of the Kingdom of God. Pray together for God's kingdom by praying the Lord's Prayer.

STEWARDSHIP MOMENT

A profound stewardship prayer is offered by the young King Solomon in today's first reading. He asks the Lord to give him an understanding heart, compassion towards God's people and the insight to distinguish right from wrong. An understanding heart, or wisdom, is a gift from God. It is a gift that enables us to make good decisions and prudent choices. Cultivating and sharing this gift is essential, especially when poor decisions and lack of compassion have consequences that affect the lives of others. During these disquieting times, are we asking God for an understanding heart? Are we exercising good stewardship over the gift of wisdom? Are we sharing our compassionate hearts with others?

Dear Friends,

Peace be with you!

Jesus never experienced old age. He died at age 33. Though fully human like us, he never felt the disorientation of a fading memory, the aches and pains of arthritis, the dimming of his vision, the halting step, diminished strength, loss of hearing and stooped shoulders.

But no one had greater empathy for the widowed and infirm than Jesus. Indeed, his Jewish tradition elevated honoring father and mother to a commandment. And in fact, Jesus' very last instruction before he died, delivered from the cross, was one compelled by his concern for the elderly – his own mother. As recorded in the Gospel of John, "When Jesus saw his mother there, and the disciple whom he loved standing nearby, he said to her, 'Woman, here is your son,' and to the disciple, 'Here is your mother.'" The disciple was John.

Jesus went beyond merely asking John to "take care of" his mother. He declared them mother and son, a profound familial bond, with John taking Jesus' place as Mary's child, also suggesting that Jesus had been caring for his mother, most likely widowed by then, all along. "From that time on, this disciple took her into his home," the Gospel states.

Housing, security, protection, care, family. These also are the priorities of Catholic Charities Hawai'i in its commitment to Hawaii's seniors – our mothers, our Fathers, our grandmothers and grandfathers.

The theme for this year's Catholic Charities Sunday is "His mercy is from age to age," a truth declared by Mary in her Magnificat, and also the theme of Pope Francis' 2023 World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly.

In today's youth-oriented, ego-centric, throw-away culture, our elderly are too often dismissed, shoved aside, left alone, receiving less than adequate care, and no longer valued as contributors to society. Catholic Charities Hawai'i counters that attitude with its strong obligation to our kupuna, assisting them with housing, transportation, counseling, social activities, leisure, case management and more. But our seniors must not only be seen as recipients of services, but treasured as "teachers of tenderness," as Pope Francis put it, "so that their experience and wisdom may help young people to look toward the future with hope and responsibility."

Our kupuna are precious. And deserving. Please be generous this Catholic Charities Hawai'i Sunday to support them – and all the other sisters and brothers served by Catholic Charities Hawai'i. Your wonderful support in the past is deeply appreciated!

Catholic prayer for generosity Philip Kosloski - published on 05/22/21

Often called the "Prayer of St. Ignatius," it was not actually written by the saint.

Many Catholics are familiar with a prayer more commonly known as the "Prayer of St. Ignatius." It is on the back of prayer cards and is often memorized. Yet this prayer for generosity was not written by him at all.

Jesuit priest Fr. Jack Mahoney details the history of this prayer on the website Thinking Faith. It dates back only to the late 19th century and is not found in any of St. Ignatius' writings.

At the same time, the prayer is certainly in the "spirit" of St. Ignatius and is one of the most popular Catholic prayers around.

Here you can find this prayer for generosity, asking God to give you a more generous heart .

Lord, teach me to be generous, to serve you as you deserve, to give and not to count the cost, to fight and not to heed the wounds, to toil and not to seek for rest, to labor and not to look for any reward, save that of knowing that I do your holy will.

Constancy and effort


Keep on keeping on, but do it ever more effectively. Time is our best ally to guarantee good results in life.
