

From the Desk of the Pastor

"I love you, Lord, my strength. My God, my rock of refuge, my shield, the horn of my salvation, my stronghold! Praised be the LORD, I exclaim, and I am safe from my enemies."

Today's readings are all about love — the radical love of God for His people and the radical love we are called to live out in response. The stewardship way of life is nothing more and nothing less than the practical application of loving God and neighbor in our daily lives.

Jesus sums up the message of all the prophets, as well as the purpose of all God's laws in today's Gospel passage, from Matthew. It is a message we have likely grown up hearing but it is so beautiful and so challenging, it bears repeating again and again. It is Christ's response to a question about which commandment is greatest. His answer reveals both the greatest and the second greatest commandments.

He says, "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind... The second is like it: you shall love your neighbor as yourself."


How is the second like the first? What do the two commands have in common? Love. Love God first and love neighbor as self. This is the heart of the stewardship way of life — simple enough for a child to understand, challenging enough to be the life's work of every "grown-up."

Family Connection

Children learn about love from real, concrete examples witnessed in family life. We can help children to love God and love their neighbors by showing everyday acts of love, generosity, and kindness—our own expressions of our love for God. These acts, small and large, are the expression of what Jesus identified as the two greatest commandments: love God and love neighbor. Make a poster together as a family. Write the words Love God in the center of the poster and write the words Love Neighbor near each of the four sides of the poster. Read together today's Gospel, Matthew 22:34-40. Talk about how Jesus taught us that our love for God is revealed in the love that we show to other people. On the poster, use pictures and words to show some of the ways that your family shows their love for God by loving others. Pray the Act of Love.

STEWARDSHIP MOMENT

There is one command that summarizes this weekend's Gospel: to love. For Jesus there is no distinction between these two commands of loving God and neighbor. One naturally flows from the other. In fact, for Jesus, these commands constitute a way of life for Christian stewards; a unique approach to life and to their relationship with others. Our neighbors include everyone with whom we come into contact: family members, friends, people we don't like, strangers and particularly those most in need of our love and compassion. Love calls us to open our hearts and do more to help others grow closer to the Lord. How might we follow Christ's love command more fervently?

7 Ways to be assertive and charitable at the same time Cerith Gardiner - published on 10/23/23

When managed well, these two traits can be beneficial for all concerned and lead to some truly positive outcomes.

You might think that being both assertive and charitable at the same time is impossible to achieve. After all, the very nature of charity requires putting the needs of other people before your own. However, in helping others it's important not to lose yourself in the process. And actually being both assertive and charitable makes for a powerful combination that can promote healthy interactions and foster positive relationships. The cornerstone of this approach is recognizing the inherent dignity of all human beings. In fact, by valuing and respecting every individual, we can cultivate assertiveness in a way that uplifts others as well as ourselves

UNDERSTANDING HUMAN DIGNITY

To be assertive while charitable, it's important to first recognize the intrinsic worth of every person. Understanding that every individual possesses unique experiences, perspectives, and feelings is crucial. This acknowledgment lays the foundation for respectful communication and genuine empathy.

ACTIVE LISTENING AND EMPATHY

Being assertive doesn't entail dominating conversations. Instead, it involves active listening and responding thoughtfully. Acknowledge the viewpoints of others, demonstrating empathy by putting yourself in their shoes. This not only validates their feelings but also shows that you value their input, nurturing a sense of dignity.

EXPRESSING YOURSELF CLEARLY AND RESPECTFULLY

Assertiveness requires the ability to express your thoughts, needs, and boundaries clearly and respectfully — this isn't always easy if you shy away from conflict. A great way to assert yourself positively is to avoid passive-aggressive language or dominating conversations. Where possible, strive for a balanced approach that ensures your voice is heard without belittling others. Remember, being assertive doesn't equate to being aggressive.

SEEKING WIN-WIN SOLUTIONS

When assertiveness meets charity, the goal should be to find solutions that benefit all parties involved. This approach is rooted in the belief that every person deserves respect and consideration. By actively working towards mutually beneficial outcomes, you uphold the dignity of others while asserting your own needs.

SETTING BOUNDARIES WITH COMPASSION

Respecting the dignity of others also means recognizing the importance of personal boundaries. Communicate your limits in a compassionate manner, emphasizing that these boundaries are not meant to undermine anyone's worth but to maintain healthy relationships. This approach will help generate an environment of mutual respect.

USING "I" STATEMENTS

"I" statements are a powerful tool in assertive communication. They allow you to express your thoughts, feelings, and needs without placing blame on others. For example, saying, "I feel ..." or "I need ..." demonstrates self-awareness and a willingness to share while preserving the dignity of all parties involved.

PRACTICE PATIENCE AND TOLERANCE

Being assertive while charitable demands patience and tolerance. Recognize that not everyone will respond positively or immediately to your assertiveness. Try to allow space for others to process and be open to feedback. This approach reflects a commitment to valuing the unique journey and experiences of every individual.

First Reading



Reflect

"Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." This is also known as the "Golden Rule." We are quite familiar with this phrase and have applied it many times in our lives. My father always used this phrase as part of his pep talk when we would get into disagreements and/or drama with our friends. He emphasized the importance of the Golden Rule, and its meaning to treat others the way you would want to be treated without the expectation of receiving the same treatment back from them. He always referred to the Golden Rule as love in action.

We know love, right? Who is the love in our life? God is love. God made us in His image and likeness (totally on repeat!) and has given us life and love beyond all measures. We are to "love the Lord, our God, with all our heart, with all our soul, and with all our mind." This is what we are to do. Likewise, we are to do the same with our brothers and sisters in Christ – we are to "love our neighbors as ourselves." Can you imagine if the entire human race practiced these two greatest commandments? Our world would be a world of love, joy, peace, and harmony. But it starts with us. If not you, then who?
