

From the Desk of the Pastor

"Lord, you have the words of everlasting life."

Greetings from St. Anthony's Retreat Center in Three Rivers, CA! I am here for the Federation of Diocesan Liturgical Commissions Region XI meeting. Along with receiving liturgical updates from the national office and the bishops committee on Divine Worship, we participated in the second round of the synodal process by reflecting on the October 2023 Synod Synthesis Report. I can't wait for what the Holy Spirit has in stored for the Church.

In today's Gospel, Jesus purifies the temple area because it is being misused as a marketplace. He becomes angry at their lack of reverence for God. He spills the coins of the money changers and overturns tables, saying, "Take these out of here, and stop making my Father's house a marketplace."

Jesus witnessed the way people mistreated the temple — the place to worship God and God alone. He drives out evil and works to purify all that is sinful in that place. This is what Jesus wants to do for us this Lenten season. He wants to remove all impurity and evil in our lives and hearts so that we may have a proper dwelling place for the Holy Spirit. Let us ask ourselves, what areas of our life need cleansing? Let us name those areas and invite Jesus to purify us. He became man to carry our burdens and wipe away our sins. He has given us boundless mercy, but we must do our part to seek it and commit to living a more faithful life as a disciple of Christ. With this knowledge, let us seek to be purified from our sins so that our hearts might be a true temple of the Holy Spirit.

This season of Lent is only halfway done — there is still time to work through our shortcomings and purify our hearts for Easter morning. But let us not waste another moment. Let us name our shortcomings, seek God's mercy and invite Him to transform our hearts.

Living Liturgy

Liturgy and Spirituality: In the midst of commandments that demand we avoid murder and theft, the call "to keep holy the sabbath day" should give us pause. Rest and restoration are held in equal esteem to larceny and violent crime. While this might seem like an exaggeration, restoration of Sabbath as a path toward restoration of all of God's creation on earth is needed now more than ever.

Economy and ecology begin with the same prefix, *oikos*, which means home, family, or household, depending on the context. Jesus is angered that they were making his "Father's house a marketplace." The temple had been turned into a hub of economic activity instead of a house of worship.


Living in a society with an economy that often values profit above all other measures of success, intrinsic human dignity can be conflated with a human life being "worth" only how much a person can do or produce. Living in this reality, rest can be a radical act. In the book How to Do Nothing:

Resisting the Attention Economy, the author Jenny Odell writes, "I think that 'doing nothing'—in the sense of refusing productivity and stopping to listen-entails an active process of listening that seeks out the effects of racial, environmental, and economic injustice and brings about real change...There is a kind of nothing that's necessary for, at the end of the day, doing something."

Inherent in practicing Sabbath is making time to listen to God's deepest desires for your life to discern the most loving response. Sabbath provides space for restoration of right relationship with God, your neighbor, yourself, and the earth... (From Living Liturgy 2024)

Family Connection

Today's Gospel invites us to reflect upon our worship of God. For Jesus and his Jewish contemporaries, the Temple was an important, holy place where they gathered to worship God. The Christian understanding of worship was transformed in light of Jesus' Resurrection. In the Christian understanding, God is worshiped in a person, the person of Jesus Christ. As we read in today's Gospel, Jesus is himself the Temple that will be destroyed, but in three days God will raise him up again.

As you gather as a family, talk about places and times when you have experienced God's presence. After his Resurrection, Jesus' disciples understood that Jesus was present with them as they gathered to pray and especially when they gathered to share a meal. Read together today's Gospel, John 2:13-25. Jesus teaches us in today's Gospel that he is God's presence with us. Thank God for Jesus' presence with us, especially in the Sacrament of the Eucharist. Pray together the Lord's Prayer.


STEWARDSHIP PRAYER





This prayer for the Year of Prayer expresses the tender heart of St. John of Ávila, Doctor of the Church (+1569). He was the spiritual director to a number of saints including St. Teresa of Avila, St. Francis Borgia, St. John of the Cross, St. Peter of Alcantara.

This beautiful prayer is a plea to grow in trust and perseverance as we keep our attention focused on the love Jesus Christ constantly pours out upon us, especially from the cross.

O God most loving, who are Love itself, how we wound you if we do not trust in you with all our heart. If, after the favors you have shown us, and after having died for us, we do not feel confidence in you, we must be worse than very brutes. Throughout the days when we were estranged from you, you gave us many graces; will you then refuse them now when our only desire is to serve you? All the many times that we offended you, you cherished us. You followed after us when we fled from you. You drew us to yourself. You cleansed us from our quilt and gave us your Holy Spirit. You filled our souls with joy and bestowed on us the kiss of peace. O my God and my mercy! After the countless favors you have shown us, please keep us from ever distrusting you or questioning whether you love us and intend to save us. Give us the hope of salvation. Let our hearts rely confidently on you, even if there may be moments when we do not feel the sweetness of your consolations. Amen.

Want to live happier and healthier? Then start walking! Cecilia Pigg - published on 02/27/24

"Mom, are we walking or driving?" I love that my boys ask me this question whenever we are heading out the door. I've lived in cities for most of my adult life where it is possible to walk to the store, to church, to the library. And walk I have. Only recently have I realized and been able to articulate the simplest reason I walk: walking brings me joy.

Another reason is that it forces me to slow down and notice more around me. It makes me prioritize the rest of my day differently, giving me time away from screens and "normal" life. And the older I get, the more I appreciate the physical and mental benefits of walking.

MENTAL BENEFITS

Emotionally and mentally, walking reduces tension and stress and improves your mood. It does this in part by connecting you to your surroundings and the people in your area. Once on a daily lunch walk with my husband, we noticed a group of people gathered around a nearby drainage ditch with phones and nice cameras held aloft. We trotted over to see what was going on and discovered a beautiful Mandarin duck swimming in the ditch, quite out of place in our middle-American city. It was moving to spontaneously stand in awe with others, gazing at unexpected beauty.

Nowadays, on my morning walk with my boys, I find it much easier to enjoy their questions and engage with them than it is at home or even in the car. We sing on our walks, we talk about the funny moments in books we read, and I attempt to answer all the obscure queries that cross their minds quite happily mostly because there isn't much to distract my attention.

SPIRITUAL BENEFITS

Spiritually, walking helps me pray. Whether it is an incredible purple sunset on a Lenten evening, or the bright smile that utterly transforms the face of a fellow walker as she passes by or finding the biggest leaf I have ever seen — these all point me to Jesus! I become aware of God's greatness and my littleness all the more — which ultimately leads me to thank Him and know Him a little better.

If you need a friend to help you, St. Paul had to walk a lot on his missionary journeys. He might be a good patron saint to encourage you on your own walking adventures. We have found that a good way to keep Sunday holy in our family is by exploring nature trails in our area. One year we challenged ourselves to try a different trail or hike in our city every Sunday from spring until autumn. It was amazing how many options there were nearby! Some of our fondest memories are from those adventures.
