
Newman Center Holy Spirit Parish





6 Bible verses to help you feel fantastic! Cerith Gardiner - published on 07/28/25

PSALM 118:24

"This is the day the LORD has made; let us rejoice in it and be glad."

There's something about a bright summer morning that makes this verse feel especially alive. Psalm 118:24 is a joyful nudge to seize the day—not with stress or obligation, but with rejoicing. Each sunrise is a divine gift, a reminder that whatever the day holds, it's been lovingly crafted by God Himself. Whether your plans include a family barbecue or a solitary stroll, this verse encourages you to embrace it all with gladness.

ECCLESIASTES 3:1

"There is an appointed time for everything, and a time for every affair under the heavens."

Summer often feels like a pause — a season to breathe, reflect, and reset. Ecclesiastes 3:1 reminds us that life comes in seasons, both literal and spiritual. If you've been through a period of busyness, grief, or uncertainty, let this verse assure you that now might be your time for rest, joy, or growth. Lean into the rhythm God has set for your life, knowing that each time and season has its purpose.

ISAIAH 55:12

"Yes, in joy you shall go forth, in peace you shall be brought home; Mountains and hills shall break out in song before you, all trees of the field shall clap their hands."

This verse paints such a vivid, almost summery picture of creation joining in praise! When you're outside surrounded by swaying trees or a mountain vista, imagine nature itself rejoicing with you. Isaiah's poetic imagery calls us to step into joy and peace, walking through life with a heart attuned to the beauty around us. It's the perfect verse to read before a summer hike or picnic — letting you experience nature as a living hymn to God's glory.

MATTHEW 11:28-30

"Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart; and you will find rest for yourselves.

For my yoke is easy, and my burden light."

Summer might be a time of fun, but for many, it can also carry hidden burdens — family responsibilities, financial concerns, or emotional fatigue. Jesus' invitation in Matthew's Gospel is deeply comforting: come as you are, weary and weighed down, and He will provide rest — not just physical, but deep, soulnourishing peace. Consider reflecting on this verse as you swing in a hammock or watch the waves roll in, letting Christ's words ease your spirit.

PHILIPPIANS 4:4

"Rejoice in the Lord always. I shall say it again: rejoice!" If this verse feels like a burst of sunshine, that's no accident. St. Paul's exhortation to rejoice is an evergreen call to joy, regardless of our circumstances. Summer is an ideal time to practice rejoicing — not just when things are perfect, but always. It's about cultivating a spirit of gratitude, whether you're enjoying a sunset, a good meal, or the laughter of friends. Let this verse be your anthem for the season: rejoice, and then rejoice again!

PSALM 23:1-2

"The LORD is my shepherd; there is nothing I lack. In green pastures he makes me lie down; to still waters he leads me."

This beloved psalm evokes a serene summer day — lush green fields, calm waters, and the gentle guidance of a loving Shepherd. Psalm 23 reassures us that God provides not just for our needs, but also for our rest and restoration. As you find moments of calm this summer, picture yourself lying in those "green pastures," letting God lead you beside your own still waters, filling your soul with quiet contentment.

Reflect

In a world that often measures success by how much we own, how many followers we have, or how busy our schedules are, the message of today's readings are a wake-up call.

Jesus tells a parable of a man who stores up wealth for himself, believing it will bring hi peace and security. But that very night, his life is taken and all that he worked for is left behind. The message is clear — we cannot take these things with us. True wealth is found in our relationship with God and in how we love and serve others.

In these recent times, many people are feeling the pressure of rising living costs, job insecurity, and a sense of instability. Social media often pushes us to compare our lives with others and chase after more – more things, more "likes," more achievements. But even with all this "more," people are still feeling anxious, disconnected, and overwhelmed.

Today's first reading from the Book of Ecclesiastes tells us, "Vanity of vanities! All things are vanity!" This is a bold reminder that possessions and status cannot fill the deeper hunger in our hearts. The second reading from St. Paul to the Colossians urge us to "seek what is above," to put on the new self, and to root our identity in something more lasting — Jesus Christ.

Perhaps what the world needs right now isn't "more" stuff, but more stillness... more listening... more kindness... more simplicity. Let us ask ourselves this week: Am I holding on to things that don't last? Or am I building a life that reflects God's love, generosity, and truth? May we strive this week to be rich not in things, but in compassion, gratitude, and grace.
