



Aloha,

As you may have noticed, we have been including a special intention of the mass periodically.

I wanted to take this opportunity to provide catechesis on this

The custom of requesting a priest to offer the Mass for a specific intention, even when one cannot be physically present at the Mass, is a longstanding tradition in the Church.

This is because the Church considers the Mass as the greatest possible prayer of intercession insofar as it is the perfect offering of Christ to the Father by making present the paschal mystery of his death and resurrection.

Because of the particular role of the priest as mediator between God and man, acting "in persona Christi" when offering the holy sacrifice of the Mass, it is usually considered that special graces may be obtained when he applies the Mass to a particular intention.

The faithful generally make an offering, called a stipend, to the priest in order to apply the Mass to a specific intention. By making this offering, the faithful, by parting with something that is their own, associate themselves more intimately with Christ who offers himself in the sacred Host, and obtain thereby more abundant fruits.

If you would like to offer a special intention of the mass for the living or the dead, please contact the parish office.



OCIA INQUIRY PERIOD

The OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation of Adults), also called the Catechumenate, is a process of initiation into the Catholic Community of Faith for persons who are experiencing a conversion in their lives and seeking either Christian baptism in the Catholic Church or full Communion with the Catholic tradition of Eucharist and Confirmation.

It is a process which enables the study of the Gospels, Catholic Christian teaching, the acceptance of Christian values and morality, the development and deepening of a life of prayer and action with the support and involvement of the local Christian community. The OCIA is more than a course of instruction. It is a process of conversion, designed to meet the unique and individual needs of the participants.

Who is OCIA for? Non-Catholics who want to find out more about the Catholic Faith Those who want to join the Catholic Church through Baptism, or Profession of Faith Those who were baptized Catholic as infants but never received religious education, Confirmation, or First Eucharist.

If you are interested in joining the OCIA process, please contact the parish office. Sessions will begin in October.



Reflect

When I was in high school, one of my closest friends stopped talking to me for a while. We had always shared everything — from lunches to dreams about the future. But something shifted when I began going to church more regularly and getting involved with ministry. One afternoon, she asked why I had become "so holy and religious all of a sudden and such a goody-goody girl." I remember stumbling through my words, trying to explain to her that it wasn't about the rules of church, but it was about a growing desire to follow Jesus. Her silence said it all. For a few weeks, things were quite tense between us. We eventually talked it out, but I never forgot how something so meaningful to me could cause discomfort or even division in a friendship. We were never the same after all that.

In today's Gospel, Jesus shocks us with such strong language: "Do you think that I have come to establish peace on the earth? No, I tell you, but rather division." This feels startling because isn't Jesus the Prince of Peace? However, this passage reminds us that the fire Jesus brings isn't about division or destruction. It's about transformation. The truth of the Gospel has the power to stir hearts, challenge comfort zones, and call people into deeper integrity and mission. And when we start living by that truth, not everyone will understand. Even those closest to us may feel shaken by the changes we undergo when we follow Christ with sincerity.

In a world that often seeks to avoid discomfort or confrontation, Jesus invites us to stand firmly in faith, even when it costs us approval, popularity, or ease. He doesn't want lukewarm disciples. He desires people on fire with love, justice, courage, and truth! Let us pray for the grace to live faithfully, even when the fire of discipleship makes things uncomfortable. And I'll end with a beautiful quote from St. Catherine of Siena: "Be who God meant you to be and you will set the world on fire!"

St. John Henry Newman, pray for us!
