



Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

One of my favorite movies is the 1991 comedy *What About Bob?* Bill Murray plays a troubled, paranoid hypochondriac named Bob Wiley who innocently but annoyingly hounds Dr. Leo Marvin, played by Richard Dreyfuss. Bob is paralyzed by his fear of, well, everything, and is convinced the psychologist can heal him. But Dr. Marvin's failed attempts to heal Bob end up driving the doctor to attempt to murder Bob. He fails. The surprise is that, having faced death head on, Bob is suddenly healed. He attributes his healing to Dr Marvin for breakthrough "death therapy." In facing the cause of his deepest illness and dysfunction, Bob is healed.

Underneath this light-hearted comedy is a dead-serious resonance with this week's feast: the Exaltation of the Holy Cross. Christ is lifted up on the cross to force us to face the truth of sin and death. In that reckoning we find healing. Like Moses' snake on a pole, the cross says: this is what is causing your sickness - rebellion, disobedience, sin. Look at it! Don't run from it. Now seeing it exposed, we see life. We see our physician mercifully healing us. In this sense, we are all like Bob Wiley. The "death therapy" of the cross is our only hope for healing.

This week I invite you to "exalt the cross." If you don't have one in your house, get one. Use it for prayer. Gaze on it frequently. It teaches us to not be afraid. It heals us.



Questions of the Week

First Reading:

In their desert wanderings, the Israelites learned that repentance leads to healing. What needs healing in your life?

Second Reading:

Gospel:

Jesus reveals to Nicodemus that his death on the cross would lead believers to eternal life and save the world. What have you been taught about the meaning of the cross?



OCIA INQUIRY PERIOD

The OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation of Adults), also called the Catechumenate, is a process of initiation into the Catholic Community of Faith for persons who are experiencing a conversion in their lives and seeking either Christian baptism in the Catholic Church or full Communion with the Catholic tradition of Eucharist and Confirmation.

It is a process which enables the study of the Gospels, Catholic Christian teaching, the acceptance of Christian values and morality, the development and deepening of a life of prayer and action with the support and involvement of the local Christian community. The OCIA is more than a course of instruction. It is a process of conversion, designed to meet the unique and individual needs of the participants.

Who is OCIA for? Non-Catholics who want to find out more about the Catholic Faith Those who want to join the Catholic Church through Baptism, or Profession of Faith Those who were baptized Catholic as infants but never received religious education, Confirmation, or First Eucharist.



Read-Along: Wrestling with God

Are you interested in a read-along of Fr. Ronald Rolheiser's book: Wrestling with God? The title comes from a story the author Kazantzakis tells about asking an old monk if he still wrestled with the devil. The monk replied no, we have both grown old and no long have the strength. Now I wrestle with God. With God? Katzantzakis exclaimed. And you hope to win? No, my son. I hope to lose! But my bones remain with me still and they continue to resist.

In the preface to this book, Rolheiser says he attempted to provide a compass to help us in our search not only for meaning and faith but also a greater steadiness in life. As he says, real faith is not a set of answers; rather it leaves us in mystery, in longing, in desire for Someone big enough to embrace our questions and hold our doubts.

A tentative start date for this read-along is Friday, October 3 at 10am for about 45 minutes and continuing for six weeks. CAMPUSAMISTRY

Reflect

Every day when I walk through the hallway of my home, I see the crucifix that was given to me and my family when my father passed away 20+ years ago. At first, it was a painful reminder of loss of a great man in our lives. Over time it became of a source of comfort and strength. This crucifix is more than just piece of metal with Jesus on it. It is a sign that even in grief and sorrow, Christ's love is present. It is a constant reminder that the Cross does not end in death, but in new life.

We are reminded today as we celebrate the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross that what one symbolized death and shame has become the ultimate sign of God's victory and love. Just as the Israelites looked upon the bronze serpent and were healed, so we look upon the Cross of Christ and find hope, mercy, and healing. St. Paul tells in his letter to the Philippians that Jesus humbled himself and accepted death on a cross, and because of this, God exalted Him above every other name. The Cross, then is not just about suffering. It is about love, obedience, and the promise that God can transform even the darkest moments into life and resurrection.

When we see a cross and/or crucifix, whether in our homes, in our church, or even worn around someone's neck, we are invited to remember that we are never alone in our struggles. The Cross reminds us that God walks us, carries our burdens, and turns our pain into a path toward healing. Questions to consider this week: How do I carry the crosses in my life? How can I see them as opportunities to unite myself with Christ, trusting that His love will bring hope and new life?
