
Read-Along: Wrestling with God

Are you interested in a read-along of Fr. Ronald Rolheiser's book: Wrestling with God? The title comes from a story the author Kazantzakis tells about asking an old monk if he still wrestled with the devil. The monk replied no, we have both grown old and no long have the strength. Now I wrestle with God. With God? Katzantzakis exclaimed. And you hope to win? No, my son. I hope to lose! But my bones remain with me still and they continue to resist.

In the preface to this book, Rolheiser says he attempted to provide a compass to help us in our search not only for meaning and faith but also a greater steadiness in life. As he says, real faith is not a set of answers; rather it leaves us in mystery, in longing, in desire for Someone big enough to embrace our questions and hold our doubts.

A tentative start date for this read-along is Friday, October 3 at 10am for about 45 minutes and continuing for six weeks. Reflect

Saving up for something important, carefully planning for every dollar, cutting back on extras, looking for deals, thinking creatively about how to reach my goal, putting so much effort into making sure I'm staying on track...we realize how much energy we put into something so precious and important for us... So I wonder, do I put the same thought, determination, and care into my relationship with God and how I live out my faith?

In today's Gospel, we hear the parable of the dishonest steward from Jesus. At first, it seems strange that the steward is praised, but Jesus highlights his cleverness and persistence. If we can be so strategic about earthly things like money or possessions, shouldn't we be even more intentional with things that matter forever, like our faith, our choices, and our service to others?

Jesus also reminds us, "You cannot serve both God and mammon." It is a clear call to check ourselves and our priorities. Money and material things are not bad in themselves, but when they take center stage, they can pull us away from God. What we do with the gifts and resources entrusted to us reveals where our heart truly lies.

Am I using what God has given me for His purposes? Or am I letting possessions, status, and/or worries about money lead the way? May we seek to serve God first and foremost with all that we've been given, trusting that when we put Him at the center, everything else will find its proper place.
