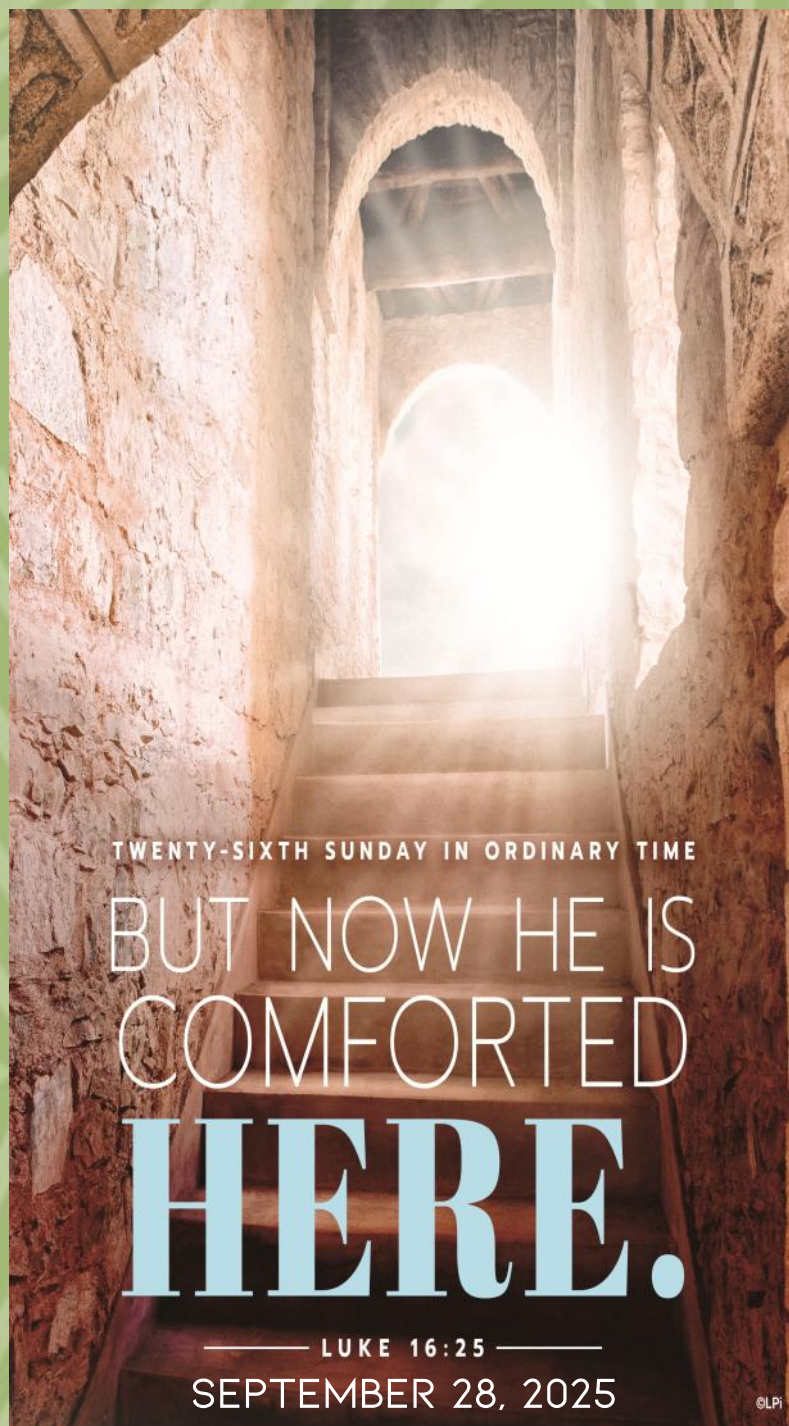

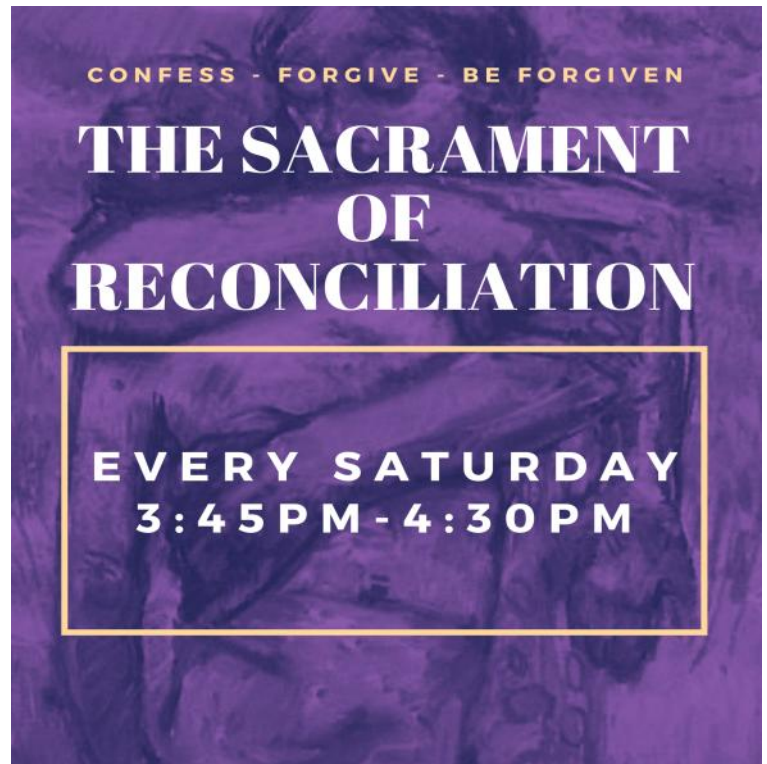

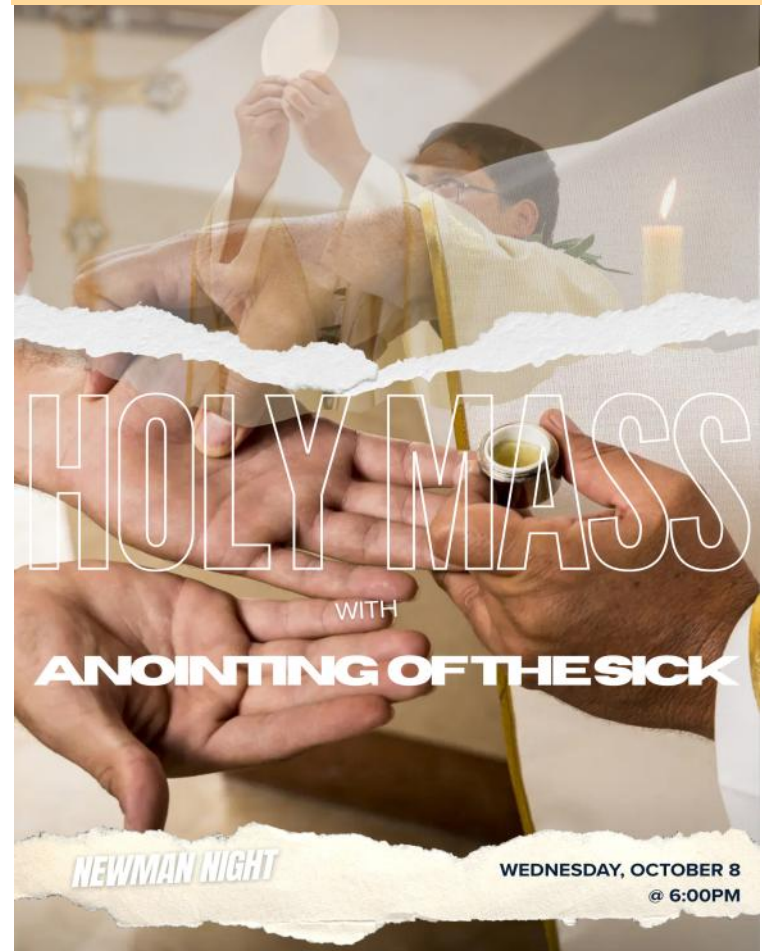
We will pray for the repentance and conversion of our great nation, asking God to save America, especially its children and future Catholics, through the rosary of Christ's Most Holy Mother.

Read-Along: Wrestling with God

Are you interested in a read-along of Fr. Ronald Rolheiser's book: *Wrestling with God*? The title comes from a story the author Kazantzakis tells about asking an old monk if he still wrestled with the devil. The monk replied no, we have both grown old and no longer have the strength. Now I wrestle with God. With God? Kazantzakis exclaimed. And you hope to win? No, my son. I hope to lose! But my bones remain with me still and they continue to resist.

In the preface to this book, Rolheiser says he attempted to provide a compass to help us in our search not only for meaning and faith but also a greater steadiness in life. As he says, real faith is not a set of answers; rather it leaves us in mystery, in longing, in desire for Someone big enough to embrace our questions and hold our doubts.

A tentative start date for this read-along is Friday, October 3 at 10am for about 45 minutes and continuing for six weeks. If there is enough interest, a second group could meet in the evening beginning October 1 at 4:30pm (time and date tentative). Reflect

Have you ever come across someone who was struggling, whether it's a person asking for food, a close friend going through a rough time, or even someone quietly suffering in silence, and find yourself unsure of what to do and/or say? It's tempting to look the other way or have someone else step in. Yet, in today's readings, we are reminded and called to care for others.

We hear in this Sunday's Gospel of the parable of the rich man who lives in comfort while Lazarus, a poor man and covered with sores, sits at his gate longing for sustenance, even scraps of food. The tragedy in this parable is not only the rich man's wealth but his blindness to the suffering right in front of him.

Today's readings are not meant to condemn wealth itself but to remind us that faith calls us to compassion, to see those who are invisible to others, to listen to the cries of the poor, the lonely, and the forgotten. God entrusts us with the responsibility to respond, even in small ways, through generosity, kindness, or simply through noticing and caring. As disciples, we cannot afford to be blind like the rich man. Each day offers us an opportunity to cross the "chasm" between comfort and compassion. Let us pray for eyes that see, hearts that care, and hands ready to serve.

"A rich man is not one who has much, but one who gives much. For what he gives away remains his forever." – St. John Chrysostom
